Directory of Open Access Journals: <http://www.doaj.org> As of October 2011, there are now 7200 journals in the directory in all fields; completely free to view and search; the full text is available for most every article. Best way to search is to browse by subject area, chose the subject of most interest to you and then look at individual issues of journals for free content.
